Sont it out now: When setting up your camp, plan ahead for recycling - read below for all the different ways you can now reduce, reuse, and recycle your Burning Man experience.

RECYCLING

RECYCLE CAMP is located in Center Camp and will accept your aluminum cans until Sunday at 6 PM. But what to do with recycling after that? Commercial recycling centers are available in Reno and listed in the Survival Guide (most are closed Monday) OR you can take advantage of the RENO DRIVE THRU RECYCLING PROGRAM that's being gifted during the week after Burning Man-100% of the recycling proceeds plus a matching grant will benefit the Gerlach High School, and YOU get to get all your recyclables out of your backseat without even leaving your car. For info on where to take your donations, stop by Recycle Camp and get one of the convenient hang tags with a map to dropoff locations. The Drive Thru program will accept all types of recyclables and will be open 24 hours,





NO DRIVING!



There is no driving in Black Rock City. You may not cruise around in your car to check things out. The only motor vehicles allowed to move around are staff/emergency vehicles and the delightful Mutant Vehicles that artistically roam our city - and all of which are registered ahead of time. Go find your camp, park your car, and leave it parked all week. While you are moving to camp, keep it to 5 MPH. Any faster kicks up dust and is not safe in a pedestrian / bicycle city.

Remember, the weather can turn on a dime in the desert and go from mild to strong in a blink. ALWAYS keep loose items battened down, and secure your belongings well before you go away from camp. If you get stuck in a dust storm or "white-out" then seek immediate

shelter and stay there. (White-outs are why goggles and dust masks are great!)

Weather/ Storms




If you are caught outside of shelter, or don't have protection then simply sit down; cover your face with your shirt and wait. Be alert for moving vehicles. If you are in a vehicle, STOP and wait for the air to clear because you will not be able to see where you are going. Likewise, If there is heavy rain then do NOT attempt to drive as your vehicle will get stuck in the mud. Tune in to BMIR (94.7 FM) for more info. Most importantly -- DON'T PANIC! Just look at all that survival gear and food that everyone has -- you'll be in good company.

Leave No Trace

You've brought yourself out to a desert where sudden winds can carry trash away without warning, or dust can instantly bury it out of sight until next spring's rains. Therefore, we remind you once again, NEVER LET IT HIT THE GROUND. Ahem. Out here, any trash that hits the ground is called MOOP, Matter Out Of Place, and it's time to make MOOP your sworn enemy. Do it for the sake of this desert.


RV PUMPING

Wireless internet? in the DESERT?



You can pick it up just about anywhere in Center Camp, a well as at 3 and 9 o'clock. PLEASE note, there is not a specific 'access point" in Center Camp – you'll need your own computer and wireless card to connect to it, and the folks working at Playa Info, Media Mecca, Rangers, etc., cannot help you or provide a better place to pick it up when it's either down or too crowded to get access. There are no public terminals or stations and the camps around the area are not "Internet Lounges" - they can't offer you anything special in the way of Internet access and they don't exist for that purpose. Use your own laptop in the Center Camp Café, or make friends with someone else who has one. Or you could just

ignore your LiveJournal this week and just be here with the rest

of us in Black Rock City. Just a thought.





Remember to LIGHT YOUR BIKE at night, and always LOCK YOUR BIKE! The only bikes that shouldn't be locked are Community Bikes. For the second year in a row a group of volunteer burners is providing a fleet of Community Bikes for anyone to ride. Although referred to as the "Yellow Bike Program," Community Bikes are (guess what?) GREEN (with no visible brand) and have the words "Yellow Bike" painted on them.

Here are a few guidelines for Community Bikes:

- Community bikes are only for those who do not have access to a bike, and rides are only a one-way guarantee.
- Do not appropriate the bike as your own property! It's a gift, and you should pass it on.
- Treat it as if it were your own, and remember personal hygiene, i.e., pants are required.
- If it breaks then rely on your own Radical Self-Reliance to get it fixed. Check with Playa Info for a repair camp.
- · Never lock a Community Bike, and never bring it inside your tent or RV (and don't take it to the default world)! Leave the bike in a public space for someone else to use.
- Conversely, ALWAYS lock your personal bike and definitely take it back to the default world (no bike MOOP). Bikes get stolen because they're not locked; NOT because people think they are Community Bikes. Burning Man is not responsible if your bike gets stolen.
- Spread the word to other participants so we can all make this program successful.

This year, in addition to existing medical and Ranger outposts, the plazas will also contain Bulletin Boards for participants to share information. Nearby, there will also be CIVIKs, which stands for Civic Information Kiosks containing valuable information from the Burning Man Organization that you should be aware of.

See those camera guys over there? Relax. The media are a welcome part of the Burning Man experience...but they are required to register with us, comport themselves in accordance with an agreement to certain rights and responsibilities that are designed to protect your right to express yourself freely. We require that they ask permission before you are filmed or featured commercially, and we want them to interact with you and become part of the community, not just breeze in, film the shiny stuff, and breeze out without making a connection.

Media cameras are clearly marked with large green numbered tags, and they should identify themselves to and reveal their tag numbers if asked. If you see someone misbehaving with their camera, please report them to a Ranger or at Media Mecca in Center Camp as quickly as possible. Swing on by Media Mecca, Playa Info, or your nearest Civic Info Kiosk in the Plazas for a look at the poster of the two types of camera tags.




HEALTH DEPARTMENT

MUTANT VEHICLES



PUBLIC TRANSPORT

Owners of Mutant Vehicles are asked to share their available space with the community while they trek around the city. So, you are welcome to approach and ask permission to come aboard if the driver feels there is room for you. But, wait for the vehicle to come to a complete stop before boarding. DO NOT CLIMB ABOARD OR DISEMBARK FROM MOVING VEHICLES. Even at 5 MPH, "hopping on" a moving vehicle can quickly turn dangerous. NEVER jump in front of a moving vehicle no matter how slowly it is moving.



(((SOUND))

If you use an amplified audio system at your camp, the volume must be held to reasonable levels. Speaker must be elevated off the playa surface, and backed by a truck, RV, or anything large and solid enough to prevent the sound from traveling backwards. The maximum power amplification is 300 watts. If a problem with sound levels continues after sound levels continues after sufficient requests and warning, the source of power for such device or system will be disabled. Art cars with sound systems are subject to the same standards, and are asked to cut their sound when to cut their sound when approaching art installations

Yep, we know you just got here, but a reminder for when you leave – it's safe to say it will take a while to get out of BRC if you leave when everyone else does. First, tune in to BMIR 94.7 for BRC traffic information and best departure times. If you plan to leave during peak hours (Sunday midday, and again Monday midday) be prepared to be patient and experience a long wait to get to the main road.

Pay careful attention to the flagging teams who are there to keep traffic moving. You must expect some delays - pack a snack and keep your water handy, and enjoy the slow crawl as a final chance to interact with other citizens and say goodbye to BRC.

If you think you'll skip the line by heading out any "side entrances" or **sneaking around to the front of the line**, please be aware that doing so is a TICKETABLE OFFENSE, and you will be fined by the BLM, who take this issue very seriously. Be prepared to wait it out, or leave during off hours when roads are clearer.

If you're planning to donate lumber to Habitat for Humanity via Burners Without Borders then we recommend that you load up your vehicle with FIRST and take it to the drop off locations (see GREEN YOUR BURN for more details). Then come back to your camp, load up and do the final MOOPing of your site. Also, if you're planning to donate food and beverages to DPW on your way out of the City then please have those items easy to access in your vehicle so you don't hold up the Exodus line.

One last thing - BE SURE TO TIE DOWN AND SECURELY FASTEN YOUR LOAD, INCLUDING TRASH, so we don't end up with trash along the highway.
