

2012 Burning Man Census





The Census is a collaborative research project that started in 2002.

Although the BRC Census is technically a survey and not a real census (where everyone in a population was sampled), it provides the most complete picture of the highly diverse population of Black Rock City.



- Based on analysis of <u>9578</u> paper forms filled out in Black Rock City during the event in 2012 (roughly 1 in 5 citizens!)
- For the first time in BRC history, these results were weighted to correct for non-response biases.
 - Implication: these results are the most reliable estimates available concerning the BRC population
- Project was approved by a research ethics committee (@ Denver University) and confidentiality of respondents is protected

Details about the weighting procedure

- In 2012, the Census lab decided to improve their weighting method
- The main improvement was the addition of a weighting procedure to correct the biases in the Census due to self-selection. (i.e., burners who decided to fill out the Census might be different from those who chose not to fill it out)
- In population surveys, the national census is used as a reference to weight (i.e., adjust) each survey.
- In 2012 BRC Census, the "unbiased" reference came from randomly sampling cars at the gate during ingress, asking a dozen sociodemographic questions of each sampled burner who accepted.
- Thus, the results from 2012 Census were weighted according to this random sampling at the gates, improving the collective accuracy of the data.



2012 Census Results

This presentation covers the descriptive results for the most important questions.

The first section of results contrast the weighted (i.e., corrected results and the unweighted (i.e., original but biased) results to help understand the usefulness of the procedure.

The remaining sections present only the weighted results

These results are the most reliable estimates that we have of the Black Rock City population.

The "real" population values could be slightly different from the presented values due to measurement error





Weighting the Census



Variables used to weight the 2012 Census


- Inherent self-selection bias in past surveys
- 2012 complemented census with a random sampling at the gate
- Random sample allowed us to weight the collected data
- Variables used to weight the 2012 Census:
 - Gender
 - Age
 - Are you a Virgin?
 - Foreign
 - English Speaker
 - US Party Affiliation








Place of residence if not USA










Where did you get your ticket for the event








Arrivals vs Departures








How many members of your family are you expecting at BM this year






How much will you spend in Nevada before and after the event








How do you generate power on the playa






Which burn events are MOST important to you (1:most; 5:least)








Do you belong to a religion






For those that do, what religion do you belong?







Do you consider yourself an artist?




If so, do you get paid?




Self-identfied sexual orientation

- ** Respondents who did not provide specific information about orientation are included in the heterosexual category to avoid overestimating the proportion of minorities




You are sexually attracted to ..

You are sexually attracted to...(for fluid/neither)





* Respondents who did not provide specific information about their sexual labels were included in the cisgender category to avoid overestimating the proportion of transgender respondents.






Do you consider yourself as polyamorous or kinkster?




